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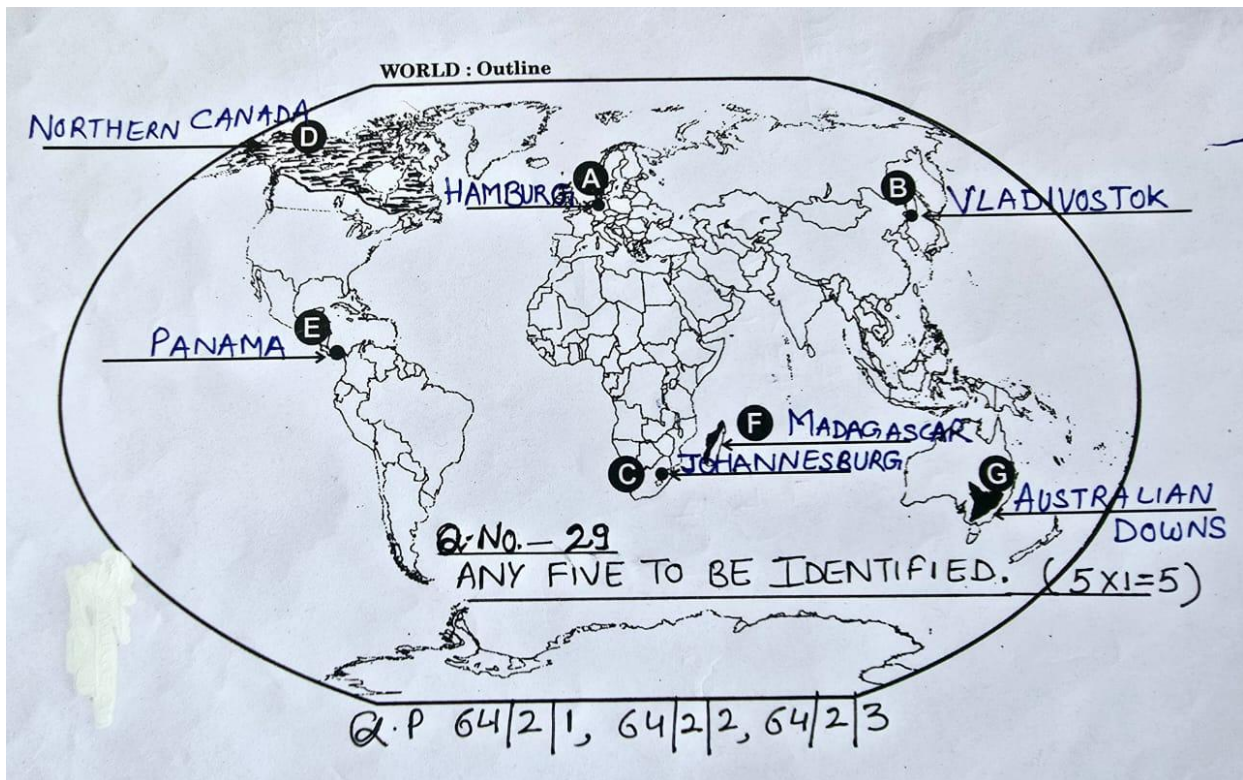

The states of Goa and Mizoram have only a little over half of their total population residing in villages.</li> <li>vi. Most of the UTs have a smaller proportion of the rural population, except Dadra and Nagar Haveli (54%).</li> <li>vii. 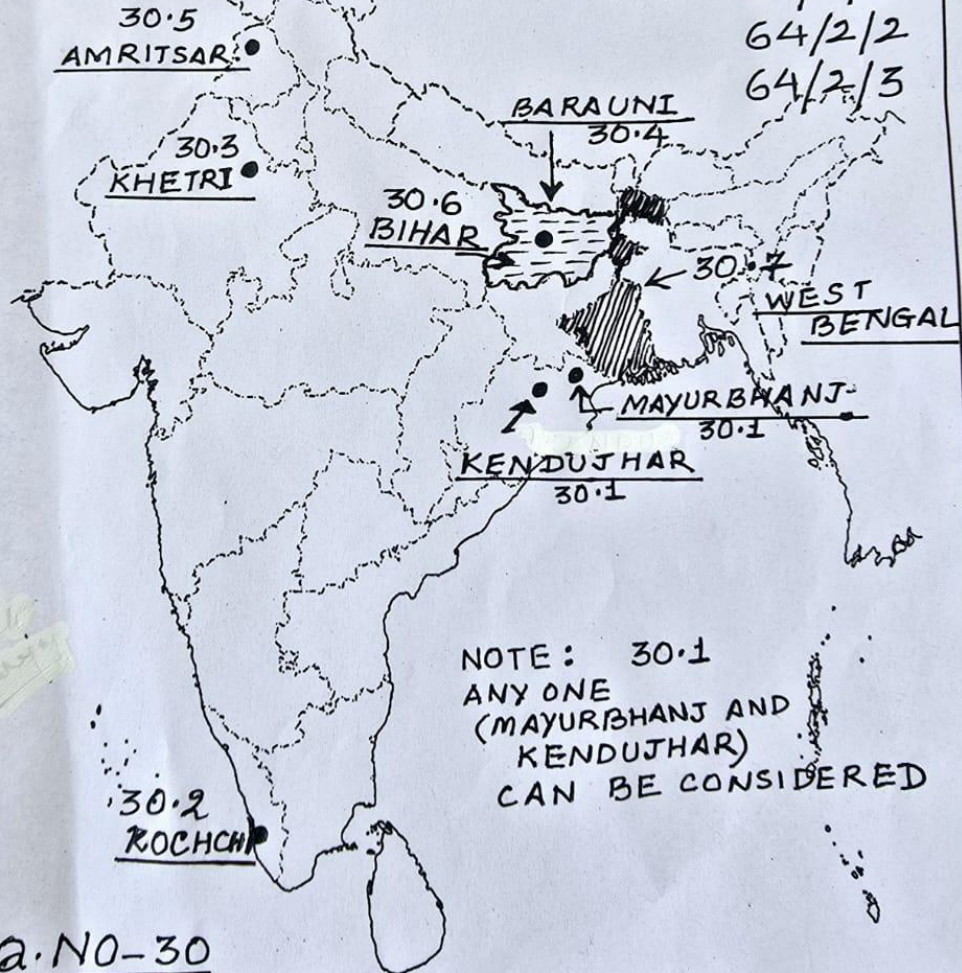
